SYLVAN GROVE VISIT

On Wednesday 21 September, East Hills Group hosted a visit to the beautiful Sylvan Grove Native Garden at Picnic Point. We invited members from Macarthur, Menai and Sutherland Groups of APS, and in total 17 people attended. Jim Mackay, Horticulturist of Sylvan Grove, led most of us on a walk through the Garden, while others enjoyed a quiet chat or wander near the entry. We had an excellent morning tea with a wide array of delicacies, and sold a few of our propagation day plants to members and visitors. Here are some photos I took during the morning. Jan Douglas



FOLLOW-UP FROM THE SYLVAN GROVE VISIT

Jim Mackay has supplied a few plant names which he couldn't recall during the walk, but promised to provide when he remembered. Here's what he has sent us:

- Dendrobium gracilicaule syn. Thelychiton gracilicaulis (Spotted Orchid or Leopard Orchid) This one has yellow flowers with pink spots on the outer side of the sepals. There are two clumps on the trees in the orchid circle and another clump on a rock down past the gully near the small dry rainforest. Normally found from the Hawkesbury River up to Queensland.
- Anopterus macleayanus (Macleay Laurel) Someone enquired about this tree which at present is about 5 metres but will reach 10 metres or more. A slow growing straight-up tree with 20-30cm lanceolate toothed leaves in a whorled formation sited directly across from the spotted orchid on the rock as mentioned in the previous paragraph. Abundant small white bell flowers late spring-early autumn. Apparently a type of thrip is its pollinator. If so, it seems to be present at Sylvan Grove, because the plants are reproducing here. Normally comes from northern NSW and further northward. Family: Escalloniaceae
- Rhodosphaera rhodanthema (Yellow Cedar) Tree/large shrub growing near the far gate on the top south side of dry temperate rainforest with an abundance of clumping brown berries. When not in flower or fruit, this tree could be confused with *Melia azedarach* (White Cedar) but actually it has no relationship with it, being in the family of Anacardiaceae, not Meliaceae. Normally comes from the Macleay River and up to south-east Queensland.
- *Epipremnum pinnatum* syn. *Rhaphidophora pinnata* (Native Fruit Salad Plant) Woody vine on the Red Cedar in the rainforest. It is native to the rainforests of northern Queensland and parts of Asia. *Monstera deliciosa* is in the same family i.e. Araceae.

EAST HILLS GIRLS TECHNOLOGY HIGH SCHOOL FETE EAST HILLS GROUP PLANT SALE

A few stalwart volunteers kept up the East Hills Group tradition of a stall and plant sales at the annual East Hills Girls Technology High School Fete. It was held on Saturday 10 September, which coincided with elections for those Councils not affected by recent amalgamations. According to Dorothy, 'the weather was sunny, sometimes cloudy with a cold wind blowing - in other words normal for us'!

We had a new site for our stall this time, but despite our request for a spot in the main thoroughfare, it was out of the general run of traffic, and was also very exposed to the wind. The organisers were helpful on the day, though, offering tables and assistance with setting up. Our stock of plants came mainly from our own propagation efforts, supplemented by 12 plants purchased from Phil Keane. We made a profit of \$150, rather less than last year. The level of interest was similar to previous years, and a few regular customers turned up.

Our thanks go to Dorothy Taylor, Kyrill Taylor, Graham Fry and Karlo Taliana – without them there would have been no stall, and without Karlo no pretty plant labels.
